With her repairs finished and lock downs out of the way, she turned to carving. This is her first finished piece, her daughter is the recipient. She is a perfectionist in carving and it has taken a lot of encouragement from each of the Thursday afternoon carvers to convince Neringa that she has finished the piece, but the result is an outstanding piece of work.

Making Dowel Hinges – Austin Polley

After being inspired by the article called 'Making Dowel Hinges' by David Hall in one of last year's Australian Wood Review magazines I thought I would have a go – but in my own way.

As the name suggests wooden dowel is the basis for these hinges. A dowel hinge works on short pieces of dowel, either attached to the lid of the box or the main body. These pivot on a sized wire or rod (I use ¹/₄th diameter brass rod for my hinges).

As we all know dowel can vary in in diameter, so the first task is to size it. While there are various companies who make special tools for this operation, I decided to make my own

Photo 1 shows my home-made jig. It was based on a YouTube video clip and works well.



Photo 2 shows the steel guide I made on my lathe for cutting the ends of the dowel for the pivot pins.



Photo 3 is of the inside of the box with the dowel hinges in place.



The final photo is of the finished completed box.



I really like the concept and also other wooden hinge designs, as it means I make the entire box myself.
