## **Manningham Turners (4th Thursday)**

### **Under new management.**

Ian Hansford, a member of the Central group since it was situated in RMIT, has agreed to lead the 4th Thursday turners. Ian will inject different ideas and add diversity to the club. We have agreed to tackle some more involved projects as a group to extend our skills and produce work of quality. The first project is an upholstered stool supported by eight turned spindles on a segmented base. All Manningham members are urged to bring some better quality material, ie. Blackwood, Myrtle, Sassafras or similar to begin the project.

### **Requirements:**

**Top.** Enough to make two discs 320mm. diam. by 19mm thick (to be fixed together to measure 38mm thick)

**Base.** 100mm x 19mm x 2metres long, to be cut and joined in segments, then turned as one piece.

**Spindles.** Eight pieces 30mm x30mm x250mm long (spares probably reqd. to account for mishaps")

Material can be machined to thickness at the club if required.

Upholstery to be selected later. Come and help make this a worthwhile activity, don't be a member in name only.

The family was impressed with both the one I turned and the real ones.



## **DUST MASKS**

### **Triton Dust mask offer.**

As per the last newsletter, I mentioned that I was trying to negotiate a bulk purchase of the Triton dust masks from Mitre 10 in Heidelberg.

So this is a reminder for anyone that might be interested in doing so to register your interest with the editor.

In addition to the above I have by coincidence had two other members approach me with masks which they believe are quite good. The one by Greg Williams is his personal observation and on speaking to him by phone it sounded quite good.

The other Article is by the Day Turners who are also trying to organise a bulk purchase of a different type of mask as compared to the Triton one and the one which Greg has mentioned.

All have value and are in different price brackets.

So please read the articles below.

### **Dust Mask (DUST BEE GONE brand)**

One of the biggest problems for people working with wood is dust. There are many dust masks on the market but one that has proved to be effective is the mask made from material, called "Dust Bee Gone".

The mask is woven polyester with two straps, one of which is of "Velcro" and it can be easily rinsed after a dusty session. Besides cleaner breathing, one of the main benefits that have been found that glasses do not fog up as they do when using other type of masks.

The mask retails at around \$80. However, one of our members has been able to source these masks at \$60.

### **EMC POWER MASK**

I have found a most delightful and effective dust mask, it is called an Air Safe power dust mask, I found that it was light, effective and at \$100 a pop very cheap compared with other masks on the market. It is not Claustrophobic as I found other masks to be, I got mine from Car-B-Tec, Bayswater, and I think that this little beauty is a must for all woodies.

## Forstener bit Extension with Morse2 Taper.



My supplier of pepper/salt mill mechanisms has had machined a number of steel Forstener bit holders, 270mm long (including taper). You can mount any Forstener bit with a 3/8" shaft into this holder (secured by two grub screws) and it will mount directly into most lathe tailstocks without the need for any other chucks or extensions.

The Morse 2 Taper is also threaded to suit M8 all thread if you wish to securely mount the Morse 2 taper within the tailstock for heavy work.

Price is \$20 for 1, and \$15 each for 3 or more.

Andrew also has a new supply of pepper/salt mill mechanisms \$15 for one or \$12 for lots of ten or more plus postage if you want them sent. They are the best mechanism I have ever used. This is the time to get cracking for Christmas – they make great gifts.
