# **Ernie Gmehling**

#### Vale Marten Visser

1937 - 2023

On Friday afternoon a number of Marten's colleagues in the Thursday afternoon carvers' group attended the Dandenong Christian Reformed Church to join his family (6 children and his spouse, 17 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren) and friends to celebrate the life of Martin Visser.

Martin was born in Holland and grew up in the German occupied country. From an early age he worked in the family business delivering briquettes and fuel on his bicycle. He emigrated to Australia with his family and had a fairly unsettled time before the family moved to East Doncaster. He worked in the building industry before setting up his own business in brick cleaning. The stories his children told were so representative of the Marten we knew, taking the boys fishing but first having to stop on the way for the boys to spend the day cleaning all the bricks on a new house, camping overnight, and then fishing; taking the ute to pick up a load of wet cement and finding much of it had gone by the time he arrived home. He drove all over Australia to visit his family many of whom had settled in Western Australia.

Marten took one last trip to stay for a week in Echuca, he fell sick after his return, being diagnosed with double pneumonia, and died in hospital on Tuesday 14 March

Marten had been a member of the group for more than 10 years. He was much loved by us all for the way in which he maintained his good spirits while he endured his health issues, as well as his contribution to the life of the group. The number of carvings that he did was remarkable, hardly a session of "Show and Tell" at our afternoon teas went past without Marten having some piece of carving to share with the group. The development of his skills, especially in his decorative carving, were much admired by us all, his last pieces were of the highest quality.

We all feel Marten's absence from the group, his positivity, the way he engaged you when he spoke to you and as a constant contributor to "Show and Tell." His output late in life has not only been voluminous but more detailed and of a very high quality.

Farewell and thank you Marten.

Background: - Robert McNamara was president in 2003 and 2004. During his time as president he built the club's library. Robert enjoyed the challenge of turning bowls from the burl of various types of Eucalyptus trees. Robert died in March 2004 while attending a wood turning conference at the Gold coast in Queensland.

It's lucky I had an old picture frame which improved the carving immensely. We are still married!



## **Japanese Tools**

As many members will know, I have been to Japan many times (37 so far) and also that Japan makes some of the best tools anywhere. I have been wanting a good set of chisels for a while and finally got to buy some on my trip in March 2023.

I had done some research and found this website - <a href="https://www.shop.kurashige-tools.com/">https://www.shop.kurashige-tools.com/</a> which has information in English and also has a showroom. It is in the outer suburbs of Tokyo but only a 10 minute walk from a station. I made my way there and found the showroom but there was nobody around. Eventually, I found a set of chisels I wanted at a reasonable price and finally found someone to talk to.

After I had shown them pictures of some of my Japanese Kumiko coasters, the lady who spoke English went and got the boss who is 83 and we had a coffee and chat for a while. He gave me a discount on the chisels and insisted on a photo before I left. The net cost was A\$1,255 for the boxed set of 10 chisels. Such sets can range from about A\$600 to over A\$10,000. Over the years, I have bought the pictured Japanese saw for several members of our club. They are available here but at around \$35+ compared to about A\$20 in Japan. They are very sharp and have no set on the teeth so are great for flush cutting. The blade is only 0.3 mm thick. The price may be a bit higher depending on exchange rate and availability of the saw at various shops.

If anyone is interested in getting a saw or even a set of tools, please feel free to contact me and I might be able to help. I will be in Japan in May and October this year.

# Woodcraft Manningham – Safe Work Procedure 37 USE OF STEP LADDERS

**DO NOT** use step ladders unless you have been instructed in its safe use and operation and have been given permission

#### PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

Safety glasses must be worn.



Sturdy footwear must be worn at all times in work areas.



Close fitting/protective clothing must be worn.

#### PRE-OPERATIONAL SAFETY CHECKS

 $\checkmark$ 

Inspect ladder before use

- a. Joints between step & side rail tight, all fittings secure, moving parts operate freely.
- b. Rungs free of grease and oil.
- c. All ladder components intact including side rails, steps, rungs or cleats.

#### **OPERATIONAL SAFETY CHECKS**

#### Setting up ladder

- ✓ Carry step ladders in their closed position.
- Mount ladder on firm footing and secure against slipping.
- Do not place ladder on any other items to increase height, eg on boxes or a table.
- Climb down and move ladder if needed. Do not attempt to jog or walk the ladder
- Fully open and lock the step ladder locks, braces or spreaders engaged before climbing.

#### Using the ladder

- Face ladder when ascending and descending
- Maintain three points of contact when climbing ladder
- Only one person at a time and check weight limit not exceeded.
- Do not over reach. Reposition ladder if needed. Your belt buckle should not be further than the side rail.
- If necessary have a second person hold the ladder.
- Carry tools on belt or tool pouch and hoist up materials.

#### **ENDING OPERATIONS AND CLEANING UP**

✓ Fold up ladder

Remove it to its storage location.

#### POTENTIAL HAZARDS AND INJURIES

Falling off ladder.

i Burns from operating room gas heater.

#### **DON'T**

Over reach on ladder.
